The more MS research that is done, the more answers will be revealed, the more mysteries solved, and the closer we will get to putting an end to MS.

2007 marked a year of discovery, with new clues to potential treatments in the pipeline, the cause of and risk factors for the disease and the impact of MS on different populations and groups. This year the society invested more than \$46 million in more than 440 new and ongoing MS research projects across the world, including several right here in Minnesota.

2007 HIGHLIGHTS

Moving treatments forward, fast

For people with MS, the current pace of drug development is simply not fast enough. This year the society launched Fast Forward, a bold technology-transfer initiative to bridge the gap between research and drug development and speed the delivery of new treatments to people with MS who need them.

Chapter awarded for research promotion

The chapter received the National MS Society's 2007 Excellence in Research Promotion Award for its work to inform and engage people with MS and their families, donors, event participants, volunteers and the general public about the latest in research.

Road to repair

Dr. Moses Rodriguez, and his team at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn., reported success in repairing myelin when they injected a single dose of the monoclonal antibody rHIgM22 into mice with an MS-like disease, taking us one giant step closer to reversing myelin damage in people with MS.

Landmark discovery in genetics and MS

After decades of laborious research in genetics and MS, scientists in 2007 identified two new genetic variations associated with MS and preliminary evidence for an additional 11 variations, completing the largest scan of the human genome for MS to date. These groundbreaking findings shed light not only on the cause, but ways to develop better treatments to stop the immune attack in MS as well.

WE ADDRESS THE CHALLENGES OF EACH PERSON WHOSE LIFE IS AFFECTED BY MS.

Asking for help isn't always easy, but we are moving to meet people where they are, ensuring people with MS and their families have the information they need, when they need it and where they need it.

Minnesota Chapter programs and services provide an ever-growing foundation of support and guidance to people with MS and their families, communities and health care professionals right here in our area.

2007 HIGHLIGHTS

- More than 60 educational programs for more than 1,200 people with MS.
- More than 80 clubs and groups connected people affected by the disease.
- Nearly 700 people enhanced their emotional and physical health at a getaway or camp.
- Nearly 70 health and exercise programs helped more than 5,000 people move forward and manage their disease through exercise.
- More than \$320,000 in financial assistance, grants and equipment programs helped nearly 800 people adapt to the ever-changing nature of MS.
- 25 students affected by MS received college scholarships — a 500 percent increase from 2006.
- More than 60 people shared mutual support with others touched by the disease through the Mentor Program.
- The Community Grant Program awarded more than \$365,000 to affiliated MS clinics and groups that work to help people with MS.
- More than 40 workshops, information exhibits and programs provided information to more than 8,000 health care, social service and other professionals who work with people with MS.
- The Minnesota Chapter Web site was viewed nearly 600,000 times in 2007. Popular programs web pages included the programs calendar, Equipment Exchange, MS Annual Convention, Lending Library and self-help group listings.

Meeting human challenges means making human connections.

People with MS face challenges big and small throughout the course of the disease. The chapter's four licensed social workers — or MS navigators — are here to help people affected by the disease when they need it most, whether it's a phone call, one-on-one meeting or home visit.

In 2007:

- › MS Navigators provided information to nearly 6,000 people and one-on-one, ongoing assistance to more than 250 people.
- › More than 200 people received professional legal advice and consultations about finances, employment and more.
- › Nearly 600 new people registered with the chapter.
- › The Lending Library provided information about MS through books, videos and DVDs to nearly 400 people.

New avenues for support

Sometimes, coping with the obstacles of MS is easier when talking to people you have things in common with. In 2007 the chapter launched five new self-help groups targeted to specific interests, including groups for newly diagnosed, people of color, mildly affected, professionals and singles, in addition to existing groups for care partners, couples, GLBT, men and women.

Dr. Martha Cincoski was named National Volunteer of the Year for her leadership and unfailing support in housing and research advocacy and Reggie Walton earned a National Lifetime Achievement Award for his 36 years of service to the society.

To fuel the MS movement, we must influence change. We do this by making our voices heard, sharing our stories and taking bold action to make life better for people with MS.

In 2007 the Minnesota Chapter raised awareness through comprehensive outreach, ignited the MS movement at a grassroots level, advocated on MS issues and launched a bold, new brand that speaks to all people by addressing the universal elements of the disease — rallying together more people in the movement than ever before.



2007 HIGHLIGHTS

- More than 100 people representing 48 Minnesota districts met with their legislators to advocate for MS-related issues at the Capitol Conference.
- MS activists helped achieve success on key issues including legislation to improve access to health care, assistive technology and safe-patient handling in medical facilities.
- More than 10,000 people received the chapter's MS Connection newsletter six times a year and more than 11,000 people received the Programs Connection newsletter six times a year.
- The chapter exhibited at more than 30 fairs, expositions and other events, reaching more than 26,000 people.
- Chapter advocacy efforts helped create additional reimbursement options to sustain the Fairview MS Achievement Center.
- During MS Awareness Week, the chapter reached more than 500,000 people through special inserts in the Star Tribune and Duluth News Tribune, exhibits at malls, universities and high schools and volunteer "street teams" that raised awareness by canvassing skyways, bus stations, grocery stores and more.
- Hundreds of feature stories, articles and interviews about MS and MS Society programs and events were placed in print, radio and television media outlets throughout the chapter area.

Each year thousands of people come together to increase public awareness and raise funds to find a cure, develop better treatments and help people with MS in our area live well in spite of the disease.

2007 HIGHLIGHTS

- Minnesota Chapter Bike MS events raised \$3.4 million — up 20 percent from 2006 — with more than 5,000 cyclists participating.
- More than 9,000 people participated in Walk MS, raising nearly \$2 million.
- Participants in the MS River Road Run Motorcycle Tour and MS Sno Rally Snowmobile Tour raised nearly \$250,000.
- This year's Women Against MS luncheon was the biggest to date with more than 500 people in attendance. The eighth annual event raised a record \$125,000 and included an auction to raise funds for the Minnesota Chapter Scholarship Program.
